Assignments: The entire course in on Canvas. All assignments are available to view and must be submitted via Canvas. There is one textbook and it is required to follow the course and to submit assignments.

The course is divided into four modules and the same pattern exists for each module. There are three assignments due in each module: a paper, chapter quizzes (every chapter), and participation in a discussion thread. Discussions are assigned 10 points, papers are 20 points, and Quizzes are 5 points for each chapter; a total of 45 points per Module - resulting in a course total of 180 points. The standard grading scale is used.
